

Bar Shouldered Dove Geopelia humeralis
The Bar-shouldered Dove is native to Australia. It is protected under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974. It is a medium sized pigeon varying in size from 26 to 30 cms with a voice a distinctive and melodious "cook-a-wook" or "coolicoo". It's flight is direct and swift and wings whistle while the birds are in flight. The breeding season in our area is February to April. Its nest is a flat twig and grass platform usually in trees and shrubs, mangrove or scrub. The dove will lay two, white, glossy and rounded eggs. They



feed on the ground in short grass near cover and need to drink throughout the day. They mainly eat seeds of grasses, herbs and sedges, as well as rhizomes (small root storages). Both parents incubate the eggs and feed the chicks. Young doves are fed with 'crop milk', specially produced by the parent birds (a common characteristic of pigeons and doves). Cafe Closing The Brush Turkey Cafe will be closed for July and August.


Artist at the Brush Turkey Cafe

Funnel-web Spider Alert

After falling of a tree near our house recently, a funnel web spider wandered into the house so I thought it might be timely to find out a little more about these spiders, which are often seen in Wootton around March every year. Thinking it was coincidental that the spider appeared immediately after the tree felling I looked up for some information. They live in burrows in sheltered positions in the ground, or in stumps, tree trunks or ferns above ground. Their burrows are lined with a



sock of opaque white silk and several strands of silk radiating from the entrance. Females can live up to 20 years and are rarely seen **except during tree felling**, excavation or landscaping work. They usually pass their entire life inside their burrow. Males wander at night, especially during or after rain, and may enter houses. Funnel-web venom is highly toxic. To avoid being bitten, wear gloves when gardening, know what a burrow looks like, wear shoes and carefully shake out footwear and clothes before wearing. First Aid: Keep calm; move only if necessary; if limb is bitten, apply pressure bandage to bite area and around limb towards heart; immobilise with a splint; collect spider specimen (even if squashed); seek medical aid as soon as possible. The Great Lakes Catchment Management group had their first quarterly meeting for 2009 in the Memorial Hall at Coolongolook on February 11. Members from the local community were invited to attend the open forum for landholders and the presentation by Gerard Tuckerman on the status of the 'Darawakh wetlands reclaiming project', held after lunch.

One of the aims of the group is to enhance the communication flow between all the agencies undertaking activities in the Great Lakes catchment. Agencies include Great Lakes Council (GLC), Mid-coast Water (MCW), National Parks, Department of Primary Industries representing State Forests, Catchment Management Authority, Landcare and Taree Council. Each agency provides an update of their ongoing and upcoming activities allowing other agencies and community representatives to ask questions and make suggestions. For example, MCW and GLC were able to synchronize their efforts at the Crawford River weir pool, that provides drinking water to Bulahdelah. The main focus of the February meeting was that the agencies are all working together to submit grant proposals to the new Federal Government's 'Caring For Our Country' (CFOC) initiative, to ensure the continued funding for staff and current and new projects. More details of the initiative can be found at http://www.nrm.gov.au/. Great Lakes has been identified by the Federal Government as one of 11 coastal hot spots in Australia, or one in three in NSW (http://www.nrm.gov.au/business-plan/coastcarepriority-hotspots.html) and so grant proposals are focused on activities that meet the CFOC objectives. The GLC's Environmental Special Rate (ESR) also provides funds that cover staff salaries, such as catchment management officers and a number of projects. Some funds from the ESR are also used to lever extra funds. For example, the current Sustainable Farming Program being run by GLC received \$140,000 from the 08/09 CFOC programming.

Do the flashing lights on fire trucks make you panic?

Two members of the Wootton fire brigade (Mike Badcock and Bernard Carran) responded to the call for volunteers to help in Victoria's bush fires. Fortunately the worst of the fires were over by the time we arrived. We very quickly became aware of how traumatized the communities of the fire affected areas were when, for example, we stopped our trucks on the side of the road (with no lights flashing) in one of the local villages on the edge of the fire affected area. Once stopped people from the houses ran out questioning us as to whether we knew something they didn't. It was obvious there was panic in their voices! On that particular day the temperature was 23C, no wind, no sign of smoke yet people in the town were still frightened. We were advised not to put our lights on unless in an emergency as the locals associate the lights with trauma.

On a lighter note, the experiences of sleeping (or not) in tent city were an eye opener – next time ear plugs will be essential equipment as some firies certainly know how to snore!

The message that comes out of these fires is that all households in hilly, bush terrain MUST have an effective fire plan. During the next three to six months everyone in our community should prepare their own fire plans because ultimately your own personal safety is your responsibility. Assistance in developing a fire plan can be provided by contacting your local brigade (Mike Badcock, Wootton Brigade Fire Captain, 49977337).

Our local brigade is short on volunteer members. Anyone interested in joining the brigade is welcome to contact Mike Badcock.

I have a family of Land Mullet that live on my verandah under the freezer. They frequently scoot around my house picking up dropped crumbs and insects. They're quite friendly and not particularly scared by humans. Sometimes when I'm washing up one runs across my



feet and gives me a bit of a scare. Sometimes while I'm sitting on the lounge I feel something is watching me and I look up to see the mullet on the back of the lounge looking at me. I have to get up quite close before it takes off. Sometimes the whole family turns up and disappears under the fridge. The other day it did something it hasn't before. After cooking a big pot of soup for the community dinner I noticed upon moving the pot that the land mullet had settled very nicely around the gas ring under the pot. I suppose it was nice and warm. If I'd turned on the gas without looking it would have got a fright! I actually had to touch it to make it move. It then ran off and lurched itself into the air then landed on the ground and made off to less busy areas. This launching off reminded me about the tree snake the other day. I was sitting on the verandah and heard the familiar slide of a snake across the roof but noticed the slide was going on longer and was picking up speed. I looked up and saw the snake take off from the verandah roof. It looked like it was flying. It landed well away from the house, promptly slithered off and disappeared out of sight. You don't think of animals taking a run-up to make distance but I do now. **Bron Little**
