

Stick insect (*Phasmida or Phasmatoptera*): an order of insects, known as stick insects in Europe and Australasia; stick-bugs, walking sticks or bug sticks. The group's name is derived from the Ancient Greek φάσμα phasma, meaning an apparition or phantom, referring to the resemblance of many species to sticks or leaves. Stick insects are good pets because they are quiet, won't scratch the furniture and will never pee on the carpet! They take from 2-3

Sharing Wootton with our snakes

Snakes are a sign of a healthy ecosystem, all snakes are protected in NSW and killing one is an offence so it is a good idea to overcome our fears.

Local **non-venomous** snakes include the *diamond python*, *coastal carpet python* (carpet snake), *green tree snake* (yellow-bellied black snake, grass snake).

The most common **venomous** snake in our area is the *red* bellied black snake. Others include the swamp (marsh) snake, Stephen's black banded snake and brown snake. The red bellied black snake is a shy snake. When approached this snake will often freeze to avoid detection. On the other hand, the brown snake often reacts defensively if surprised or cornered, putting on a fierce display and striking without hesitation. However, if approached over a distance, they will usually choose to flee or remain stationary, hoping to avoid detection. If there are black snakes around you will not see many brown snakes because their habitat is different. Black snakes must live within cooee of water, preferably running, whereas browns don't. They just come down to drink. All that a brown snake really wants to do is steal mice and be left alone.

***Snakes are not naturally aggressive and prefer to retreat. They will only attack humans if provoked or hurt. Most bites occur when people try to kill or capture snakes - try to just calmly walk the other way.

How to deter snakes: make your garden less attractive to snakes by keeping shrubs trimmed, lawns mowed and tidy. Remove any piles of rubble, wood, roof sheeting or leaf clippings where snakes can shelter, snake-proof any refuse bins, ponds and aviaries with fine mesh, consider blocking access to under/ around the house.

Tip: Snakes hear through vibration so mow away from the house to avoid directing snakes towards it.
