DISTRIBUTION WOOTTON COOLONGOLOOK BUNGWAHL BUNYAH BULAHDELAH

Crested Shrike Tit (Falcunculus frontatus)



While walking around our property with friends we heard a bird tearing bark off trees and banging away. Turned out a crested shrike-tit, the Eastern form, endemic to the east coast of Australia. It is evaluated as being of least concern on the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species unlike the northern one considered endangered and the western one considered near threatened, both from loss and fragmentation of habitat! The crested head, robust body and strong bill are features common to all three races. The bill is used to open seed pods or to prise bark off trees to get at larvae. The sound of chunks of bark being ripped away can often be distinctly heard.

Council merger update

On the 12th July some Wootton residents attended the meeting in Bulahdelah run by Mid-Coast Council, concerning the forced merger of the Great Lakes, Taree and Gloucester Councils. It was an eye opener! Glen Handford, interim General Manager, ran the meeting and made a presentation explaining what was happening and how they hoped to handle it. He couldn't present accurate financial figures because of the time frame and the fact that Taree's figures were unreliable. Also there were John Turner, the Administrator, and ex Councillor representatives from all three councils.

Equity in rates across the whole area is a big issue as well as maintaining roads and bridges. Council are trying to "keep the community fully informed" and will be holding more meetings, probably every two months. These meetings are widely advertised so there's no excuse to be left in the dark about what's happening with the merger.

My mother grew up at Montrose (now 529 Wootton Way) and I have been coming there and to Legge's Lake (as it was) for holidays ever since I can remember. I grew up in Canberra, married a NZer and lived most of my adult life in Auckland where we had 5 sons. We bought the 15 acres at 527 Wootton Way from my uncle in 2001 and have been using it for holidays since then while we lived in Orange, NSW then Auckland and most recently in Sydney - my husband and I moved to live at the property in May this year ... so my connections with this area go way back and I still have quite a few relatives here.

Wootton Community Plan

Back in 2008 a community plan was developed for Wootton with input from a lot of local residents and assistance of the council. This plan was filed away by the council and, although the volunteer groups have continued to maintain a vibrant community in Wootton there has been no use of that plan by the community or the council to lobby for local needs.

A good example of how a local community plan can be advantageous is the Coolongolook, Wang Wauk, Wallingat Plan. Among other things, the development and use of this plan has seen Coolongolook obtain fencing around the oval and the erection of a substantial toilet block that is going to be open to the public at all times. A local community information sign is in the pipeline. While Coolongolook would like Wootton to be a part of their plan, a large number of the Wootton community believe we should have our own plan. This actually means we should update our existing plan and then make the best use of it we can to meet our local needs. Tracey Farrant, the Community Engagement Officer from the new, amalgamated, MidCoast Council has been out to visit the region, agrees that Wootton's needs are different to those around Coolongolook and is keen to help.

So, how are we going to go about obtaining input from the community and updating the plan? Well, to start with, please realise that the plan belongs to the whole community – it is not the responsibility of the individual community groups—so we need your help!

First, a community survey has been included in this edition of the Wootton Valley News to help us obtain as much information as we can from as broad a cross section as we can about what it is you like, don't like and worry about in regards to the Wootton area. We would like to collect information from both residents and visitors—be they family visitors, guests of our local accommodation providers or more local visitors from Forster, Bulahdelah and so on. Tracey offered to create the survey for completion on the internet; it can be accessed from the Wootton community website under the Community Plan webpage or https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/WoottonSurvey. For those of you who prefer to complete a paper copy you can use the one included in this newsletter, print a copy from our website or get Tracey to email you a copy. Once completed you can put them in the letterbox at the Brush Turkey Café or mail to Tracey ensuring complete anonymity for your comments. Tracey will then get these results included into the database before providing the data to us.

We will provide the results on the Wootton Community website prior to a community workshop that will be held on the 17th September at 2pm in the hall. At this workshop we will discuss and reflect on the results of the survey and then incorporate them into the updated plan that will be provided to council.

Wootton is a wonderful, diverse community with the village, small and large properties, home-based and tourism-based businesses and tourist attractions. To make sure that your needs are incorporated into the plan please make sure you complete and submit a survey and, if possible join us at the workshop.

Local Holistic Farming TAFE Courses

Holistic Management is a process of decision-making and planning that gives people the insights and management tools needed to understand nature: resulting in better, more informed decisions that balance key social, environmental, and financial considerations. Many of our members will soon complete the first locally conducted Holistic Management TAFE Certificate Course, subsidised by TAFE and facilitated by Brian Wehlburg (an Educator in Allan Savory's Holistic Management) with guest instructors from NZ and Queensland. A practical advanced course is also in the planning, which along with the first course, will provide 8 of the 12 units required for the TAFE Diploma in Holistic Management. Most importantly, the courses provide an opportunity to learn more about Holistic Management within the context of our local community. Graduates will have an opportunity to become community leaders and mentors at future local courses and study sessions.

Spring is here – ask the Lyrebirds.

Friday 15th July, the day frost came to Wootton. Sunrise and all quiet outside, the usual bird chorus was silent—they weren't getting up just yet! How crazy were we, jumping into a car to drive to the Williams river rainforest; it's usually the place to go in midsummer for a dip in the clear icy waters draining from Barrington Tops.

But this was to be Lyrebird day for us. The Superb Lyrebird, Menura novaehollandiae, is usually heard and not seen. Sort of. You're never really sure what you're hearing as

the male lyrebird rattles off a currawong's call followed by a flock of black cockatoos, then maybe some magpies and rosellas, and catbirds and whip birds. Sounds like they're all in the one little part of the forest, along with a sort of "chu-chu-chu-chu-chu" sound that nothing else makes. Usually nothing except the lyrebird makes it, anyway. Is it impertinent to answer back with a whistled tune, that he answers with redoubled cascades of song drowning out such amateurish at attempts?

Just over O'Sullivan's Gap was the first sighting. Sort of loping across the highway, tail strung out behind, brisk but not panicked the same as crows knowing just how far and

how fast to move as you drive by. Not noticing us of course, just going about the day's business.

In the rainforest above Salisbury we heard them all day, starting around 10am as we walked along blowing "smoke" from our mouths in the still-cold forest air among giant trees dripping with tresses of moss. No lyrebirds to be seen during the morning, not even a shed feather, just lots of scratchings along the track like someone's chooks loose in a giant garden. Were they really finding lots of worms there?

The calls continued as we ate lunch at Rocky Crossing, hard to hear above the roar of the water tumbling and churning and spilling through the

narrow channels above Currawong Creek. It was late afternoon that things started to change, as the earth relaxed and started to inhale the slightly warm air. We were excited to see one lyrebird moving along the track ahead, it headed to the right and let us pass before returning to carry on scratching, and it was silent. Was this a wild-lyrebird-chase? The next one was also silent, both looking like females without the showy tail feathers. We noticed and passed a display mound looking fresh, and also some scratchings with underground mushrooms (native truffles) the birds might have been digging for.

Then just as our feet were telling us the car *had* to be very close or they were going to stop anyway, we rounded a bend and saw movement ahead in a little open area. A male was in full display and singing his head off. The lyre feathers over his head just gorgeous, how could any females resist such a handsome fellow? We stood respectfully (peering through binoculars) and listening with whispered compliments then sadly for him we had to start walking while our feet were willing. And he ruffled, folded his tail and slid into the shadows - how could we be so forward as to interrupt his show! As we moved on we heard him start up again, louder than ever.

Four lyrebirds in one day, one with a full display, what a great way to thaw out from the frost!
