

Fan-tailed Cuckoo Cacomantis flabelliformis

The Fan-tailed Cuckoo is a slender bird, easily identified by a yellow eye ring. It has a dark slate-grey back and wings, becoming pale rufous below, with a boldly barred black and white under tail. It eats hairy caterpillars, but will also take a variety of other insects and their larvae. It's call is a mournful, descending trill. As with most other species of Australian cuckoos, the Fan-tailed Cuckoo is a brood parasite; laying its eggs in the nests of other species of birds. Host species include flycatchers, fairy-wrens, scrubwrens and thornbills, particularly the Brown Thornbill. A single egg is laid in the nest and one of the host's eggs removed. The young cuckoo generally hatches earlier than the host's eggs and proceeds to eject the other eggs or hatchlings. The seemingly unaware foster parents then rear the cuckoo chick. The Fan-tailed Cuckoo migrates to this area in August to December to breed. Seen recently in Wootton.



Yesterday I noticed this contented Python sunning itself near the chook yard. I really feel lucky to live in this environment and experience the amazing occurrences in Wootton.



This python has obviously eaten a small Joey or bandicoot and will lie around in the sun for the next couple of weeks and digest. I only hope the Goannas don't find it like the last one. Nature is in abundance at the moment. I sit on my verandah eating breakfast and try to listen for a moment where there are no bird calls. It rarely happens. They definitely don't get that in the city. Last week I noticed this bird with a striped tail and it made a familiar sound, one I hadn't heard for a long time. I located it with the binoculars, looked up my Readers Digest Bird Book and identified it as a Fan Tailed Cuckoo, a bird travelling through our area at this time of the year and the one on this month's front cover. It felt good to have identified another bird. About a month ago I was coming home late along Wattley Hill Rd and just after passing Ferny Creek Rd and along a bit further my headlights picked up 4 sets of eyes looking into our headlights. There right in front of me were 4 baby foxes bouncing around on the road. It was only a second but I was amazed how cute they looked. I didn't run over them I managed to swerve past them. Finally I'd like to tell you about the 2 wedge tailed eagles along Squires Road that have been eating the carcass of a

still born calf. They looked so supreme sitting on the fence posts standing over a metre tall and swooping into the gulley each time we passed. Apart from the Brush Turkeys walking the verandah at 6 o'clock sounding like human footsteps life's pretty normal. The city people don't know what they're missing.

Dear Wootton Community Network Members,

Thank you for your emailed communications with regard the Forests NSW (FNSW) latter of advice, dated 23 October 2008, concerning planned harvesting operations for Wang Wauk. State Forest and related amangements to protect the Wootton Historical Railway Walk (the

It is FNSW belief that there is a misunderstanding regarding the proposed 10m exclusion zone, which will be applied to those areas of the Walk not already occurred by other Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (IFOA) exclusion tools. The following advice is: provided in this regard.

FNSW manages native forest for timber production according to the principles of acclogically sustainable forest management. Every horvesting operation on State forest is planned and completed under the IFOA system, which sets out conditions and also requires compliance with the following licences:

- Environmental Protection Licence;
- Terms of Licence under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995; and
- Fisheries Licence Conditions.

NB: the Lower North East IFOA can be found at http://www.forest.rew.gov.au/floe/de/dafault.aap.

In the compartment of Wang Wauk State Forest in quanton, and as per license conditions, harveeting exclusions will be applied to:

- areas of reinforest
- high conservation value old growth forest
- riparian (streamside) areas
- ridge and headwater habitet
- slopes greater than 35 degrees, and
- areas that have been reserved under the Forest Management Zoning (FMZ)

In addition, specific exclusions will be applied for threatened species that have been identified within or adjacent to the compartment area.

The majority of the Walk is outside the area planned for harvesting. This section of the Walk that traverses the area planned for harvesting is known as "the Gorge" and is approximately 400m in length. Where the Walk and/or remnants of the logging railway do not fe within one of the abovementioned IPOA exclusion zones, a 10m exclusion zone will be applied. 10m is the standard width of exclusion zone that has been applied to other logging military remnants across the Central Region. Trees inside the exclusion zone will not be removed. nor will trees outside the area be felled into this zone.

The recent investment of time by PNSW, Conservation Volunteers Australia and the Wootton Community Network in maintenance works on the Walk has resulted in improved accessibility via vegetation clearance and tread board replacement, improved directional signage and grading of Worth's Creek Road are the next steps planned for this project. Given this. PNSW has no desire to adversely affect, or act detrimentally to, the integrity of the Walk as it now exists.

CAT AWARENESS

Feral Cats

Cats are not native to Australia. They were introduced probably around the time of first European settlement. During the 19th century, thousands of cats were released in the gold fields to control mice. Cats were also popular with settlers to keep down the numbers of rabbits and native rats.

Many were released - or escaped - into the bush, where they were able to fend for themselves. These cats did not depend on humans for food or shelter and in effect became wild - or 'feral'. They spread rapidly across most of the continent. It is estimated that there could be 400,000 feral cats in NSW and around 12 million across Australia. Feral cats prey on a wide range of native Australian wildlife species, including small mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, insects and fish. During breeding season, a female feral cat raising kittens may eat up to 20 percent of her body weight in prey every day. Direct competition for food and other resources may also contribute to declining numbers of native predatory species such as birds of prey, quolls and various reptile www.environnment.nsw.gov.au

Keeping cats as pets

We all live near areas of bush, and treasure the native wildlife that lives near us. If you own a pet cat, there are a few simple things you can do to reduce the impact of your cat on wildlife:

- · Always keep your cat indoors at night
- · Consider keeping your cat indoors, or within your property, at all times
- Get your cat desexed
- Don't dump unwanted cats or kittens in the bush
- · Make sure your cat always has enough fresh food and water
- · Check your cat into a cattery when you go away
- Make sure your cat has identification!
- Don't feed stray cats
- Putting several bells on a cat's collar may help to reduce the cat's ability to hunt.

Under the <u>Companion Animals Act</u>, cats born in NSW after July 1999, and any cat that has changed owners since that time, must be microchipped and registered for life.
