Short-beaked Echidna

(Tachyglossus aculeatus)

Named after a half-woman, half snake creature in Greek mythology as it was perceived to have features of both mammals and reptiles, the Echidna is the oldest surviving mammal on the planet today. Found all over Australia, this little chap lives in Wootton. Echidnas are solitary animals and are not territorial. They eat ants and termites, also larvae of other invertebrates such as the Scarab beetle, other adult beetles and earthworms. Their tongue can dart out and extrude up to 18cm to catch its prey, with the help of its very sticky saliva. Female echidnas become sexually active around age 5, they are 'monotremes'



meaning that they lay an egg. The baby echidna (called a 'puggle') hatches from the egg by using its egg tooth and pulls its way along the mother's hair into the pouch area. *Photo*: Pat Tate - taken near the café, saved from dogs. Seen here burying itself in the ground to try and hide.

Wootton Historical Railway Walk

On 26 November Wootton celebrated the 20th anniversary of the opening of the Wootton Historical Railway Walk. Twenty seven people took part in a bushwalk along the path of the old railway. We arrived at the Brush Turkey Café and had "Woottonshire Tea" – homemade scones, jam and cream – before a short talk. Craig Tate described how the walk was created and Kevin Carter provided a short history of the timber industry in the area. The walk follows the rail line that carried timber out of the Wootton forests and then onto Mayers Point.

Twenty years ago the Wootton Coolongolook Progress Association put forward a proposal to find the old railway which ran through State Forests in Wootton and turn it in to a walking track. With the support of a New Work Opportunity Programme, 15 locals, the Forestry Commission and the Dept of Employment Education and Training, the project came to fruition. Six months of hard work, surveying, clearing lantana and fallen trees, building bridges, steps, stairs, seats, picnic tables and toilets saw the completion of a 6 km heritage walking track. As a bonus most of the participants gained valuable work skills that would set them up in permanent work.

Unfortunately State Forests do not have the resources to maintain the walk but Conservation Volunteers Australia and local volunteers regularly keep the track maintained, although it is now only a 3 km walk and the old Trestle Bridge, which was originally at the end of the walk, collapsed quite a few years ago.

Kevin and Craig took a group each, swapping over on the way back. The weather was perfect and it was great to have guides so knowledgeable about the history, flora and fauna and relics to be seen along the walk, including bridge timbers, railway track and sleepers. We walked through old railway cuttings and over bridges next to timbers now covered in a green moss. While walking along you could imagine where the trestle bridges spanned the gorges and you could almost hear the clicketty-clack of the train's wheels and the steam hissing from its funnels. Upon returning to the Café we were treated to a barbecue lunch and afterwards Kevin showed some old film of the logging industry in the area.

It's a relatively easy walk with many species of trees and other flora as well as being a bird and wildlife haven. For a short bushwalk or if you are interested in railway or timber history, now is a good time to visit.

To get there, turn west from Wootton Way and continue along Squires Road for 6 km to arrive at the start of the walk. If it's a Sunday, don't forget to visit the Brush Turkey Café and sample the homemade food, coffee or the famous lemon myrtle cheesecake.

Wootton Community Food Swap

Yes, the Food Swap in Wootton is back. Sue Williams hosted the first swap back in October when we shared homemade bread and buns, native flowers, lemons, fresh green vegetable, chicken and duck eggs and an array of aromatic herbs. The November swap, hosted by Peter Dixon on a horribly wet weekend, was held in the hall. Numbers attending and the selection of produce was excellent with a range of plants, pumpkin, beans, lettuce, eggs, homemade tabbouli and bread.

Just a reminder as to what the food swap is. It is an event where anyone can bring anything that is homemade or home grown. For example, fruit and vegetables, pickles, jams and preserves, eggs, cordials, bread, cakes, slices, seedlings, bulbs, seeds and so on. There is no limit to how many items you might want to bring. All items to swap are put out on tables and after a cup of tea, a chat and a sticky beak, everyone takes what they think is a fair exchange for the swappables they brought.

Over the summer it will be held on the second Saturday of the month from 5pm prior to the supper and movie nights in the café. The community library in the hall will also be open during this event. The next one will be held on 12 December.

Wootton Rural Fire Brigade

You will have seen on the community notice board that **fire permits** are required until 31st March 2016. If you require a permit, contact Fire Control in Tuncurry on 6539 7700 to arrange for a member of the Wootton Brigade to visit you and issue a permit.

Training is on the first Sunday of every month from 9am at the fire station in Squires Road, Wootton: 6 December and then 3 January, 7 February, 6 March.

The Wootton Brigade currently has only two heavy vehicle truck drivers available to drive our large fire truck on week days. Both of these people work so there will be many occasions where the local brigade will not be able to respond to emergency situations in our valley. If you have a heavy vehicle driver's license and wish to help your local community, please contact Mike Badcock about joining the brigade.

We are now moving into what is expected to be a long and dangerous fire season.

So, it is essential that everyone in the Wootton Valley has a fire plan in place and that all their equipment is serviceable. If you would like assistance to develop your fire plan, contact the Wootton Bushfire Brigade.

On Monday 19 October the Sustainable Farming Group was fortunate enough to meet the Buffalos and observe them enjoying a swim at Burraduc Farm. We were also given the opportunity to taste freshly made organic mozzarella, creamy ricotta and several other cheeses (all made traditionally without chemical agents). The Group learnt that Buffalo milk has half the cholesterol and twice the protein of cow's milk, which is why it's known as liquid gold throughout Europe. Our host, Elena Swegen was recently

awarded the prestigious Churchill Fellowship to research best practice buffalo farming in Europe and share her experiences back in Australia. Elena and Andrei Swegen are committed to protecting the environment and producing low volume, high quality

organic dairy products for our local community.

We are now all eagerly awaiting the Council to give the green light for a small artisan cheese room to be fitted out in the dairy so we can access fresh ethically produced milk, cheese and yogurt.

Police latest news

On the 9 November police from Taree, Forster and Bulahdelah executed two search warrants at two addresses in Wootton. As a result of these actions two men aged 47 and 39 years were arrested and taken into custody. These men face various charges including break, enter and steal, possession of stolen goods and other offences. One of the men has been held in custody with bail refused until his next court appearance on the 5 January 2016, with the other released with bail restrictions applied.

As a result of the action a large quantity of previously stolen property was recovered from the locations. Any person who believes the property may be theirs is asked to contact Taree Detectives or Bulahdelah police with their inquiry.
