

White Cedar moth (Hairy Grub) Leptocneria reducta
The hairy, grey-brown adult moth lays clusters of greyish eggs on trees, woodpiles or even shade cloth. The
dark brown caterpillar has orange feet and a dim yellow
line along the back, growing to 4cm. It is covered in
bristles, to which some people are allergic. They hide by
day in crevices on or near the ground sometimes under
a fine web, swarming in the evening in a seething mass
of hundreds of hairy brown bodies undulating in an eerie
silent flow up the tree trunk and along the branches to



the leaves, which they eat voraciously. The caterpillars feed communally on the foliage, and when a tree becomes defoliated, they wander everywhere forming the common trait of a processional line in search for another tree, invading homes etc. in their search. They seem to have no competent natural predators, birds showing no interest. Native wasps may be their main enemy although not very competent at tracking the caterpillars down. They feed primarily in the White Cedar tree but even if completely defoliated it only cause temporary stress. To get rid of them, it is best to wait until early night, when the hairy grubs ball up. Boiling water is a quick and effective way of killing them if they have become a pest.



Edie's Story - A life spent in Wootton Edie passed away on Saturday 16th May at Bulahdelah Hospital. She was 85 years old. We spoke with her a few years ago and she was happy to share with us her memories of her life in Wootton. Our sympathies goes out to all her family, Ron & Rosslyn & family, Robyn, Letitia and Samara and her brother Jack Squires. £die Mudford, was born Edith Mary Squires on 1st October 1923 at Boolambayte. She was delivered at home by her midwife grandmother, Mary Jane Squires. Edith was named after both grandmothers, Edith Evelyn Sheather and Mary Jane Squires. Her father made his living, at that time, 'in the bush' with his bullock team hauling logs. The family, which then consisted of her parents, John Henry and Attis (Harriet Beatrice Attis) and her older brother Colin, moved to Gloucester where John 'worked the bush'. When Edie was about four the family moved back to Wootton, where they 'selected' a farm adjacent to where the tramway ran, near where now runs Squires Road. In those days there was no road. In fact, Attis, in later years wrote many letters to the then Council at Stroud lobbying to have roads built. The local Councilor Harold C. Higgins who lived in Wootton was of great assistance to Attis. John's parents had already taken up a 'selection' on a farm, where the old mill remnants can still be seen, along Wattley Hill Road. Edie's dad continued to make a living in the bush with his bullock team. In fact, Edie can remember, even as a young girl, helping her dad and brother in the bush. The family expanded, adding a younger sister, Elvie, and a brother, Jack. They lived in a two-bedroom weatherboard farmhouse, which was extended, as the family expanded.

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They grew most of their vegetables, raised chickens for eggs and had a house cow. They reared pigs and very occasionally killed a chicken. Chicken was a treat, usually only eaten at Christmas time. Fresh and corned meat was bought from the butcher at Coolongolook who delivered twice a week in his little truck with the back tray closed in. The baker delivered from Bulahdelah. The family made ginger beer and hop beer, but to keep it cool it was kept in the river. They had no refrigeration when Edie was a child. Later on when she married she had her first kerosene fridge and could make ice blocks. So that is how they lived - growing most of their food, no refrigeration, wood stoves for cooking and tank water. "When the water was low in the tank we'd have to wash in the river."

Sounds like an idyllic life!...and Edie would agree. She told us, "they were the best days of my life, when the train ran through Wootton." The railway went through the forest all the way from Boolambayte to where the Trestle Bridge Picnic Area is today. On the Squires' property the railway line forked, one line ran to Mount Gray and the other, called the 'Hauler Line', went for six miles. "The loco would shunt where we lived and the driver would stop and pick us kids up sometimes and give us a lift up to Wootton. There was a driver, a man stoking the fire and 2 men working the brakes on the log carriages. The tram would sway going over the bridge and you would just hope it stayed on the tracks." It did, but there were a few accidents when the train derailed.

Most people, in those early days of Edie's childhood, made a living from bush work or dairying. John and Attis decided to try dairying, constructed their own dairy bales and milked about 30 cows. Milking was done by hand with a bucket between the legs. The kids always helped with the dairy and had their chores to do before and after school. Attis also put together and sold 'soup packs' from her garden and made butter, which she would sell for sixpence, and deliver to the people living in Wootton village. The 'village' of Wootton was a thriving little township consisting of two general stores, a post office, a blacksmith shop and the office of Mr. Smedley the manager for Alan Taylor Sawmills, on the corner of Worth Street. Of course there was the tramway. There were also three tennis courts in Wootton, but only three cars. The grocery shop would give a month's credit to everyone. "No-one never paid their bill." said Edie. Attis would put in an order and the tram would deliver it to their farm.

ne only real drawbacks were that there were no telephones and the nearest doctor

ires family returned to Wootton, Edie and Colin started school where husband and Mr & Mrs Gilmore, taught them. After dairying chores and walking to school all the eir nails inspected showed their clean handkerchief before reciting "I honour my ly King, I salute my flag" and singing the National Anthem (God save our King). ays lots of kids to play with, lots of brothers, sisters, cousins and neighbours. ances were a major interest and social activity. Attis and John taught their children he aid of a wind-up gramophone. Attis said, "If you can't waltz, you can't dance." nost of the dances in Wootton, held nearly every Saturday night. People came ay as Markwell, Krambach and Bungwahl. Edie revisited the story that her brother reviously told us. Her story was that a Jersey/Guernsey bull was lying on the rail te to the village dance. Edie and her cousin, Olive, ran back to the safety of a e, retreated home where brother Jack rescued them by delivering them to the eback. Apparently that particular bull had been 'playing up' and Dad always said, bull!" Attis and John took over the remaining general store, on the highway, in the d ran it until 1971. They had hand pumped petrol bowsers out the front. Edie said lop." Edie met her husband, Raymond Albert Mudford, when he worked for her uires on his farm (Eric Wilkes' farm today). Raymond was known by everyone as sn't sure why he was called Kay, but it rhymes with Ray, and she thinks it may ause he was "so good looking". Anyway, they married the day before she turned otember 1942, in a church in Taree. Kay had enlisted in the army in 1939 and narried Edie and then went back to war until 1945, spending time in Victoria, Borneo and Malaya. Edie lived with her parents both whilst Kay was away at war ırn home. In 1948 they bought a 285 acre (116 hectares) property where Edie still y and Edie dairied and raised a family. Kay later worked for the Department of n the Bulahdelah Mountains. They had three children, Norman, Ronald and as eight grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.

HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLAN CHECKLIST (from the RFS website)

- Know two safe ways out of every room
- Draw your escape plan on paper and discuss your escape plan with your family
- · As you escape make sure you close internal doors behind you
- Decide on a safe outside meeting place eg. Near the letterbox
- Make sure that your windows and doors can guickly open if and when required
- Install smoke alarms: test them regularly, change the batteries at least every year
- Smoke alarms alert you to a fire, an escape plan can then help get you out alive
- Practise your escape plan regularly with all your family members / householders
- If there is a fire in your home, do not wait, EVERY SECOND COUNTS, escape immediately and then call 000 from a neighbours home
- Once you get out, STAY OUT, never go back inside a burning building
- Remember to consider the special needs of children, the elderly or the disabled when developing your escape plan SAFETY TIPS
- Remember, smoke from a fire will make you confused and that you cannot see in smoke
- When asleep you will not smell smoke and it will in fact put you into a deeper sleep
- Oil, gas or wood heating units may require a yearly maintenance check
- · Only ever use fuses of the recommended rating and install an electrical safety switch
- Home fire safety is important for the whole family and preparation can prevent a tragedy.
