#### Spiny Mat Rush Lomandra longifolia

This tufted plant, from the same family as the Grass Tree, is found in many different habitats from sand dunes, open forest, creek banks to rainforest. It is recognised by its tough, strappy leaves and prickly clusters of flowers. The leaves are shiny and from 40cm up to 1m long and 8-12 mm wide. The tips of the leaves are prominently toothed. The stalkless flowers grow in clusters 1-2cm long on branches along a flattened stem. They are a creamy colour, sometimes purplish in the centre. There is a spiny bract at the base of each flower cluster. The leaves were used by Aboriginals to make baskets, strong net bags and traps for fishing.

Permit season started on 1st October. Please contact Robyn Smith on 49977209 or Mike Badcock on 49977337 for a permit to light fires. Please note you will need to give them plenty of notice as they only inspect your proposed fires on Thursdays. An indication of the potential severity of this fire season was the announcement of a Total Fire Ban for Saturday the 8th. Even if you have a permit you cannot light any fire during a ban, except for food preparation. If you have a permit read the conditions carefully, especially with the westerly winds we are experiencing at present. If in doubt do not light. You will be liable for any damage caused by your fire. Very heavy fines and /or gaol can be imposed for lighting a fire without a permit. Remember a permit does not absolve your responsibility to think and act responsibly. Any fire causing damage will be referred to the police and if serious enough the Coroner's Court.



## **Dyers Crossing Landcare Group Inc**

Dyers Crossing Landcare Group Inc came into being in early 1999, soon after the Wallis Lake ovster scare. Dairy farmers in the area were concerned about the disposal of dairy effluent and its impact on the water quality in the Wallis Lake system. It was only later that concerns extended to a wide range of environmental and sustainability issues. Recently, many new people have moved into the area and, as a result, the membership of the group has changed and, similarly, interests changed. People have come from urban and more densely-populated areas to live on the smaller acreages that have resulted from subdivision of land in the area. These people have joined an already-existing group of long-term residents who are concerned with environmental issues and natural resource management. Our membership covers a wide areas, including in Dvers Crossing, Nabiac, Krambach, Firefly, Failford, Wootton, Coolongolook and Forster. As well as conducting onground projects, we run workshops and field days of interest to our members and the local community. For example, recently, we have conducted sessions on indigenous tree identification, the protection of habitats for native flora and fauna, native seed propagation and bushfire risk management.

Dyers Crossing Landcare Group Inc has just published a field identification guide for local indigenous trees. The book is 128 pages in length, contains 80 colour photographs, and is spiral-bound to facilitate tree identification in a field setting. It has five sections: Section 1 provides information about how to use the book, including keys for use in identifying trees. Section 2 is the main section of the book and contains colour photographs, diagrams and descriptions of 72 common Australian trees and shrubs found on the Mid North Coast. Section 3 contains information relating to protecting habitats for common and threatened species of plants and animals. Section 4 contains a description of four major weed trees. Section 5 contains a list of resources and further reading. The book can be ordered by mail for \$30 from Dyers Crossing Landcare Group Inc, P O Box 3 Nabiac NSW 2312. Alternatively, copies can be obtained for \$25 directly from Robbs Rural Supplies, Nabiac, Krambach Post Office, and Dyers Crossing Produce Store, Wallanbah Road, Dyers Crossing.

On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> November, 2005 we will be hosting a lecture by **David Holmgren**, the noted permaculturist. David will give his lecture in the Nabiac Showground Hall at 7.30 pm. The lecture is free for members and \$8.00 for non members. This price includes a light supper. David Holmgren was the co-originator (along with Bill Mollison) of the permaculture movement which started in Australia in 1978. He is an author and international speaker and is committed to presenting permaculture ideas with practical projects for a realistic sustainable lifestyle.

We warmly welcome new people from the Wootton area to join our group and invite you to attend one of our general meetings which take place on the first Thursday of every other month. Our next meeting is on 3<sup>rd</sup> November. ## Lost in the Bush

At 3:30 I received a phone call from Al Freihaut, Visitors Info Bulahdelah, who told me there was a lost walker in the Wang Wauk State forest, along the Railway Walk. He gave me the guys mobile phone number and asked whether I could ring and sort him out. I rang the guy straight away. Through talking to him I worked out his location. His name was Martyn. I told him to stay there and I would come and find him. I headed off with my son, Elliott, on what I thought would be an easy find. He had pinpointed his position at the concrete pipe with a log across the path. I'd walked the path many times recently and was pretty familiar with the terrain and confident of finding the walker before nightfall. When we arrived at the location he wasn't there. We called out, but could hear no answer, so decided he must have had his location wrong. We therefore decided to walk further west along the path calling as we went. We got to the point where the walk crosses Wang Wauk Forest way, 3km from the start. From here on, the path is quite overgrown and it's not recommended to use. We decided he must have meant some other pipe and log further along the path so we decided to trudge on through overgrown paths covered with Lantana, We only had another 45minutes of light. We walked on west towards the picnic area wondering where this guy had got to. It was getting dark and we knew if we didn't find him soon he would be stuck out there over night. We got all the way to the end (6kms)and still no walker. A forestry worker happened along the road so we hailed him down. We asked whether he had seen this walker but he hadn't. I asked whether he could go back via Sam's Camp and ask my daughter to come and collect us. By this time it was dark and getting back home to ring the police was my only concern. We arrived back home at about 6:15 and checked for messages. Martyn had left a message to say that the battery was low on his phone and he would not be able to contact me again. I rang the police at Bulahdelah. No one was there so I was transferred to the Taree police. I gave them all the information I knew and left it in their hands, a relief that the burden of finding this guy was not just up to me. I rang Craig Tate, who Al Fieihaut had said had been in contact with the walker, to find out what he knew. He told me he had talked to the guy at about 12 o'clock and had what he thought, directed him out of the bush. Craig had said he had been at a locked gate which was near the fire tower at Mount Mistake, at least 1/2 a kilometer from the walk. He said he would go out with the fire crew to try and find him. At about 9pm I felt I had to give it another try so ventured out again into the forest by car and stopped along the road beeping the horn and yelling out. I was glad it was a mild night and knew he wouldn't freeze. I returned home, still wondering what had happened to Martyn. I knew he was still out there as his camper was still at Sam's camp. After an unsettled night, I was awoken by a phone call at 6am. Upon answering the phone it cut out. The display on the phone read the walkers phone number. I immediately rang the Bulahdelah police who advised me to await for a phone call from Taree.

My next phone call came from Sydney police. I was questioned again about all the events that had taken place and advised that there was a meeting in Bulahdelah at 8am to arrange the search. I arrived at the police station and saw SES, volunteer Fire Brigade and police in white overalls. They had arrived from Sydney by helicopter and were about to set off on the search when a forestry worker, Mick Worth, brought him in. He had ironically found him wandering along Worth's Road. He rang the Bulahdelah Police to inform them that he was found. Martyn and Mick then drove to Bulahdelah Police Station. I arrived at about 8:30 and walked right past the walker. I didn't get a chance to talk to him as the police were keen to question him. I wondered where he had got to! One day I would find out. A week later, Martyn left a message on my phone to thank me for my efforts and queried where I had got to. I couldn't leave it at that so I rang him and arranged a meeting at my place. He came on the Sunday with his lap top with photos of the place where he had spent the night. He had gone out again on the Saturday to find out where he had gone wrong. He had blamed the lack of signage for his getting lost. I asked him why he hadn't stayed in the spot he had told me he would be. His reply was that he thought he would make it easier for me to walk further along the track towards Sam's camp so I wouldn't have to walk so far. About 150metres or so. It turned out the spot he'd actually moved to was somewhere off the path. He'd apparently followed an old Forestry trail. He hadn't doubted that he was wrong. I still can't fathom why someone would move away from the location he had pinpointed for me. It just seemed a crazy thing to do. Martyn has since contacted me again and called in and gave me a present of a set a cb's. They've been really fun and I'm sure will be useful when we're in the bush. All's well that ends well.
