Green Catbird (Ailuroedus crassirostris)

The green catbird is a species of bowerbird found in sub-tropical forests along the east coast of Australia. It gets its name from the cat-like wailing call and is a large, stout green bird, spotted white with a dusky crown, nape and face and a white bill. The eye is red. It can also resemble the immature or female satin bowerbird that has a distinctly blue eye, a dark bill and a more



scalloped patterning on the underbody. Male green catbirds do not build a bower. Their nest is a bulky cup of twigs, leaves and vines, usually in a prickly shrub, tree fork, tree fern or low tree with an unusual layer of wet, soft wood beneath making the nest very large and bulky. This photo was taken by Pat Tate of a bird that flew into the window at Patrick and Sylvie's place - was a bit stunned but recovered well.

Wootton Community Network (WCN) News

AGM: Was held on 3rd Sept. President's report highlighted that the Network is financially stable, there are 67 financial members, numbers have increased at dinners and movie nights and on Sundays. Thanks were provided to all volunteers. However, the biggest challenge is that there is still not enough of them, particularly for Sunday trading.

There has been a slight change in the make up of the Wootton Community Network Committee. Jim has been re-elected as President, Fran as Secretary and Leanne as Treasurer. Peter Auriac comes in as the newly elected Vice President. The remaining committee members are Pat Tate, Patrick Riviere and two newcomers Catherine Mann and Julie Williams. Thanks to Pam and Danny Dunne who have stood down due to other commitments. However, Pam will still organise the artists for the café and Danny will continue to manage the website.

Volunteers: We desperately need volunteers to work in the café on Sundays. We are aware that people may want to volunteer but are concerned that they might be asked to work in the café more often than they would like. In addition we plan to open the library on **Sunday 16th October** from 10.30 am to 12.30 pm for a **coffee morning**. So come along, join us for a natter and take the opportunity to borrow some books.

Food Swap

The first Food Swap of the season will be held on Saturday October 8 from 5 pm in the hall grounds.

A reminder as to what these are all about. The idea is to bring anything that is home grown or home made. Vegetables, fruit, preserves and

jams, plants, cuttings are welcome, as well as anything crafty you may have made that you are happy to swap. The event is very informal—we all just put our swappables onto tables before we dig into tea and cake, have a yarn and look over the goodies.



Opal Cards

If you are planning to visit Sydney and use public transport, or even planning to take the train from Newcastle to Sydney then you will need to obtain an Opal Card. Sydney public transport no longer takes paper tickets!

You can obtain your Youth or Adult Opal card from Bulahdelah Post Office and load it up with money. However, if you are eligible for a Concession Opal card you cannot get these from the Post Office, you need to apply on-line or by phone. Concession cards will take 7 to 10 days to arrive. After receiving your card you can load it up with a specified amount of money using your credit card on-line or at the post office.

The Post Office is open Monday to Friday from 9.00 to 5.00 and most Saturdays from 9.00 to 12.00 noon.

Recent personal experience (Mike Badcock): I recently needed to catch the train from Sydney airport to Newcastle but wasn't able to get my Senior's Opal card in time. I was able to obtain an Opal card from the airport station but it had to be a full Adult card. The person at the ticket counter was very helpful and worked out how much money I needed to load onto the card to get me to Newcastle. However, the amount was in \$5



increments and was more than the actual fare was. This means I now have an adult Opal card that I don't need with a bit of money on it that I will end up passing on to whoever I give my card to! So, if you have a concession card and will need an Opal card get it as soon as you can—don't leave it to the last minute!.

Burraduc Farm is the only NSW Water Buffalo Dairy producing fresh milk and artisan cheeses by traditional methods in an A Grade facility on the farm. Their water buffalo and Jersey cow herds are organically managed and pastured all year. Calves are allowed to stay with their mothers and enjoy free grazing. Buffalo milk has been referred to as liquid velvet or white gold. This long awaited local produce is now finally for sale including: Burraduc Buffalo Mozzarella, Buffalo/Cow Feta, Full Cream Pot Set Yoghurt, DolceNina Fresh Buffalo Cheese, Buffalo Scamorza, Traditional Whey Ricotta (only available on occasion and in small volumes), Full Cream unhomogenised Buffalo and Jersey Cow Milk. Please note that the dairy needs a week's notice for orders, especially at the moment when the farm is low on milk until calving begins in November. Wootton Community Plan

There were 20 locals who attended the community plan workshop—an excellent turn-out. Tracey Farrant, Community Engagement Officer from MidCoast Council facilitated the workshop. The Council is keen to have local community plans that can then feed into broader catchment plans, in our case the CWAG plan , and into the even broader local government area plan. With the larger merged council these plans will become even more important for local communities to have their voice heard.

We worked in three groups where we reviewed the current plan to determine what had been achieved and what might no longer be relevant. After a brief discussion around the Community Survey results (that are presented next) we worked through exercises to identify what it was about the area we wanted to keep or wanted to improve on and we tried to visualise how we wanted the area to look and function in 10 year's time. These might seem like simple questions but proved very hard to answer in reality.

Through contributions by the various attendees we heard about changes that are happening outside Wootton that may have quite a big impact on our plans. For example, a MacDonalds is being built on the highway at Nabiac and the housing development that had been approved around Bulahdelah Golf Course a few year's ago is back on the agenda.

The plan for the Council to hand back management of Crown Land trusts, including the Wootton Trust that covers the land with the Brush Turkey café, the old school and the principal's cottage is also back on the agenda.

By the end of a long afternoon (and an excellent afternoon tea spread of course) the main outcomes are still similar to the current plan with a focus on trying to balance the desire to maintain and enjoy the beautiful environment we have here with the need for financial viability of the residents which means access to jobs, internet and so on.

Where to next:

- Tracey has taken all our decisions and ideas away and will prepare a draft plan. This plan will then be made available for comment. We plan to put it on the Wootton website and an email and a post on Facebook will let you know it is available for comment. For those of you without computers a notice will be placed on the sign where dinners and other activities are advertised to let you know it is available and where they can be obtained.

Wootton Community Survey


We had an excellent response to the survey with 58 completed. Thank you to everyone who took part.


The largest group of responders were those who live in Wootton full time with 25 surveys completed (43%). Another 3 responders (5%) live in Wootton mostly full time and 7 (12%) live in Wootton on a casual basis. Twenty-three (40%) don't live in Wootton but visit either regularly or occasionally. We had two responses where one is in the process of moving up to Wootton full-time within the next 6 months and the other lives close by in Topi Topi. So an excellent range of responders.

Thirteen responders indicated they have children with them in Wootton: 7 had children in the 0 to 4 year age group, 5 in the 5 to 11 year age group and 3 in the 12 to 17 year age group.

Four responders indicated that someone in their family had special needs requiring community assistance.

Question 4 asked responders to tick the top 3 reasons of what is liked most about living in or visiting Wootton. There were 3 main themes: lifestyle/health and well





The remaining questions asked for freetext answers. The main idea(s) in each response were grouped to assist in summarising. Comments for **question 5**—'best thing' included: "Great community and beautiful surroundings", "the tranquillity, knowing the community is friendly", "rural location but close enough to rivers, lakes, beaches, forest, major towns and schools".

What is the biggest challenge when living in or visiting Wootton

Question 6 was about the biggest challenge with many and wide ranging comments.

Most comments related to problems with the internet, mobile phone coverage and the difficulty of contacting emergency services and the broader media services linked

to internet use such as down loading movies.

The proximity to towns issue included distances to medical services, shopping, entertainment, getting things fixed.

Related to this category is the lack of or distance to medical services and

the lack of public transport, particularly for those who don't drive. The road challenge included poor maintenance and drainage issues, the fact they are mainly dirt roads, blind corners on Wattley Hill and Newmans Roads particularly with the speed of traffic and the dust, the return onto the highway at both ends of Wootton Way. Other comments included concerns about the aging population and lack of young full-time residents, random power outages and lack of infrastructure where the respondent commented that the town needs more people to reach critical mass.

Question 7 continued the theme of challenges asking for the two key things seen as a threat to being in Wootton. Again these comments have been categorised. The largest number of responses related to development. However comments were concerned about the area being too over developed and not being able to farm, subdivisions, commercial and residential development, population growth in both negative and positive terms, having too much bush regeneration, loss of natural habitat and wild life reserves, noise pollution, particularly with trail bikes, lack of local government interest in the area.

poor weed management, part time residents without sufficient land management skills, lack of community spirit.

Question 8 asked for any final comments—21 comments were provided covering both the positive and challenging sides of being in the area. On the positive side comments Included the love of being in Wootton, the environment, the location, mixing with the community, the community events, the peaceful area, the increasing contribution of Wootton to the growing interest of eating/visiting small rural areas. On the flip side comments include the need for new residents to participate in the volunteer culture so the community can continue to thrive, the need for all weather road access, the ingress of illegal/unregistered trail bikes to private land holdings or forests, the need for longer leaving and entering lanes onto the Pacific Hwy at the northern end of Wootton Way, internet and mobile phone access, Wootton needs a plan for the future with some progressive stimulus from government to stop the stagnation and the concern that doing this type of activity i.e the survey and community plan is only worthwhile if the government agrees to fund or action its recommendations.

The last comment is a good place to stop and to acknowledge that this is often seen as the case. However, we have seen the success that Coolongolook has had with items in the CWAG plan and when some funding became available in Nabiac, the Council went to their plan to see where that funding could best be put to use so we know they can work. We also have Council involved in helping us prepare our local community plan. While it may be challenging to achieve what ends up in our plan it will be even more challenging, if not impossible to achieve anything if it is not in a plan—the plan will give us documented proof as to what the community wants.

During September there were some confronting stories about dog attacks. In particular, on Wootton Way dogs took to a cow calving and killed both. Others have seen evidence of large dogs. One property has photographic evidence of at least 5 dogs passing through—fortunately for him he has no young calves and no attacks. The editor was confronted by a wild dog while on her morning walk—which she subsequently cut short to ensure that her elderly dog didn't become a victim.

There appears to be a lot of names of people or organisations to contact floating around . However, Laurie Mullen at Local Land Services (LLS) is the ultimate point of contact for everyone and should be notified of all sightings, evidence and certainly of all attacks of wild dogs to ensure that action can be taken. 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Wootton Rural Fire Brigade

In preparation for the summer everyone should have their Bush Fire Survival Plan in place. Advice on how to make a survival plan can be found on www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

Fire permits are required from the 1st October to 31st March. To request a fire permit you must contact Fire Control at Tuncurry on 6539 7700. A Permit Officer, a volunteer from the Wootton Brigade will contact you to arrange for a time to visit you, assess the fire site and provide you with a permit. Even after obtaining a permit you still need to give 24 hours notice to Fire Control and your neighbours, including National Parks (65910300) and State Forests (6585 3744) if they are neighbours. Failure to comply with this rule could result in heavy fines.
