Earlier this year, Professor Putnam, a leading American sociologist gave a talk to a large audience at the Brisbane Convention Centre, in which he addressed the importance of social connections.

Social Capital is a term coined by Professor Putnam to describe the benefits derived from social networks. This, he argues makes us more productive ,benefits our careers and insulates us from the deleterious effects of social isolation.

Social networks ,it is suggested have value not only for the people in them, but also for bystanders, as a forum for mutual give and take tends to evolve, thus benefitting the community at large.

Socializing at the moment seems to be at it's lowest ebb since the Great Depression.

One of the reasons for this dramatic downfall appear to be the car as the biggest culprit. We spend significant amounts of time commuting. Long hours outside the home and TV viewing habits again robs us of time which would once be spent on communal activities.

Living in a neighbourhood where many people know each other on first name basis has the effect of lowering the crime rate. People look out for each other.

On a personal basis, there is good evidence that your chances of an early death are lessened by membership of a club or community group.

Think when was the last time you actively participated in a community or neighbourhood activity.

Before There Was Christmas (Why we have a Christmas Tree) Thousands of years ago, and long before Christ was born, people did not understand what caused winter. They believed that the gods who watched over the crops and harvests during the spring, summer, and autumn had suddenly departed. The gods' disappearance seemed to explain why plants died and trees grew bare; why the grass turned brown and the ground froze. The fear that the sun might not return made people nervous. To cheer themselves up and to encourage the gods to return to earth, they held huge festivals at the end of December. Houses and festival halls were decorated in evergreen branches, holly and ivy In those Ancient times, any plant that stayed green during the cold winter was thought to have magical powers. Try these:

Plum and Ginger Jam

1kg of dark plums, stoned and chopped 4cups sugar

1/3 cup finely chopped glaced ginger

2tblspn green ginger wine

Combine plums and I cup of sugar in a bowl. Cover and stand overnight. Combine plum mixture remaining sugar and glace ginger in a pan, bring to boil. Continue boiling uncovered and without stirring, for 15 minutes or until jam sets when tested on cold saucer. Let stand for 5 minutes, stir in ginger wine. Pour jam into hot, sterilised jars, seal when cold.



1kg plums 250g brown sugar 600ml vinegar 30g chopped garlic 30g ground ginger Salt and Pepper 500g seedless raisins

Stone plums, put into pan with sugar and vinegar, simmer until tender. Add other ingredients, cook until mixture thickens. Pour into jars and seal airtight.
