A management plan is being produced, an herbarium compiled -weeds and natives - and regular work days to control weeds and create a walking path. LANDCARE FIELD DAY 25th May KRAMBACH

Four members of the Landcare group attended the field day. Guest speakers from Water Conservation, Farming for the Future, Beef and Dairy farmer-Bob Doyle and Chris Scott from Wherrol Flat Landcare spoke. The theme of the day was "Managing Riverbanks for Profit.

They impressed upon individuals to take on a wholistic approach to their farming methods, to make a physical properties plan and a business plan. How can this be achieved?

- Obtaining an aerial photograph
- Get advice from a consultant
- Fencing off waterways which in turn reduces stream erosion reduces mutrient loss into rivers ,creates wildlife corridors-which aids in pest control.
- The use of mobile troughs-the water is cleaner and the nutrients from the manure is more evenly spread.
- The need to lessen runoff from paddocks by having 100% vegetation coverage (grass, trees etc)
- To vegetate gullies which traps water, filters nutrients, provides shade, windbreaks and wildlife habitat.
- Avoid overstocking paddocks. Use cellgrazing- using smaller manageable paddocks more efficiently.
- Plant shade trees away from waterways.
- Fence off dams allowing only controlled grazing by stock. This keeps nutrient levels low preventing algae, weed problems and encourages bio- diversity.

The advice was to introduce these practices SLOWLY. For more information contact Col Freeman Landcare co-ordinator on 49974206
